Amazonian Calendars: Indigenous Data Visualizations Exhibition

How can data become a language of relation, care, and reciprocity? *Amazonian Calendars* brings together Quechua communities, designers, and researchers to explore Indigenous ways of visualizing time and knowledge, through cycles, seasons, and stories of place. These large-scale calendars visualize ancestral activities, regenerate biocultural diversity, and communicate knowledge through artistic depictions of humans, animals, water, and forests. Each calendar uniquely represents Quechua Amazonian worldviews—what the collaborators call "cosmovisualizations" that embody cross-cultural and generational expressions of worldmaking.
